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## PBLI PROJECT - FORMAL PRESENTATION

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Your PBLI presentation during the Family Medicine clerkship is a formal presentation with PowerPoint to peers and faculty. Each site will designate time during the 5-week clerkship for students to present their PBLI presentation in person. Staff at each site will evaluate your presentation and then one staff member (Site Director or faculty so assigned) will submit a cumulative evaluation for the student.

This section gives you some general guidelines for planning and delivering a presentation. You may find some or all portions of this section helpful as you plan your presentation requirements for this rotation. Being an effective presenter is a very useful skill to possess. The quality of your presentation reflects to others how professional you are as a physician.

Presentations should be a maximum of 12 minutes, allowing 2-3 minutes for questions at the end of the presentation. Following the "ideal PBLI" template will allow you to cover all the content in the 12-minute time limit.

### General Outline for Presentation

- Provide an introduction of yourself and your presentation.
- State your learning objectives for the audience for your presentation.
- Describe in detail the patient encounter that raised your clinical question.
- State your clinical question using the PPICO parts of the PP-ICONS approach.
- Describe your search; explain why you selected your article or guideline.
- Describe your evaluation of any abstracts you found in your search to determine the relevance of the article or guideline (does it match the PPICO of your clinical question?)
- Describe the validity of the article or guideline.
  - ▶ Resources to help assess the validity of an article can be found on the Family Medicine Clerkship CANVAS site under PBLI presentation.
  - ▶ The Clinical Practice Guidelines Checklist should be used to evaluate a guideline. The checklist and a resource is posted on the Family Medicine Clerkship CANVAS site.
- If you were unable to find an article, describe other sources you investigated and/or would investigate.
- Describe your answer to your clinical question based on your findings. What would you tell the patient now? How would you resolve this issue/problem for the patient?
- Summarize your presentation.
