<ul> <li>☑ Please review the information provided in your procedure information packet prior to coming to the hospital.</li> <li>☑ If you were given an order for lab work, please have it drawn several days before your procedure. Take your order with you. You do not need an appointment for your preadmission testing.</li> <li>☑ You must have someone to drive you home and stay with you overnight after your procedure unless you are admitted to the hospital.</li> <li>☑ Do not eat or drink anything except for sips of water with your medication(s) after 12 a.m. midnight the night before your procedure.</li> <li>☑ Please bring all your medications to the hospital the day of your procedure, or an updated med list. They will be sent home with you. You will not be permitted to take medications brought in from home while you are in the hospital.</li> <li>☑ If you have a known allergy or have had a previous reaction to X-ray dye, please tell the staff.</li> <li>☐ Other instructions</li> </ul>

SUMMARY OF THE PROCEDURE: A pacemaker is a small device with two parts – a
generator and wires (leads, or electrodes) - that's placed under the skin. It is used to contro
your heartbeat if your heart beats too slowly. The pacemaker generator is usually inserted
into the upper chest under the collar bone with a minor surgical procedure. Wires are then
inserted into the heart through a blood vessel and attached to the generator. The generator
senses if the heart is beating to slow and will send electrical impulses through the wires to

Sometimes a special pacemaker with an "ICD" (implantable cardiac defibrillator) is used if you are at risk of sudden cardiac arrest. The ICD will sense when the heart is in a serious, life threatening rhythm and can deliver a shock to the heart to restore a normal rhythm.

**WHAT TO EXPECT**: You may be given medicine to help you relax. You will feel the "bee sting" of medicine injected to numb the skin where the incision will be made. When the area is numb, the doctor will start your procedure.

## During the procedure:

- A small incision, approximately 2 inches long, will be made in the upper chest.
- One or two leads (thin wires) will be guided through a vein into the heart.
- The leads will then be connected to the pacemaker, and the doctor will program and test the pacemaker.
- The pacemaker will then be placed into the small incision and the incision will be sewn closed.
- You may be awake or asleep during the procedure.

your heart to cause it to beat faster when necessary.

• You will go home with a water-resistant dressing over the procedure site that will stay on for 7 days post op. You will receive instructions regarding this dressing upon discharge.

#### WHAT TO BRING TO THE HOSPITAL

- This packet of information.
- A copy of your living will or durable power of attorney for healthcare (advance directives) if you have one.
- Any toiletry items you would like.
- Bring all your current medications. You will not be permitted to take your home
  medications while in the hospital, but the nurses need the names(s) and dosage(s)
  of each medication.
- Please <u>do not bring valuables</u> to the hospital such as purse, wallet, jewelry, money, credit cards, etc. Bring only your ID and insurance cards.

**LENGTH OF THE PROCEDURE**: The procedure usually takes a few hours. After the procedure, you will be admitted to the hospital for an overnight stay.

**AFTER THE PROCEDURE**: You may eat and drink after the test.
